We are also continuing our interviews via Zoom with selected emeriti. These interviews are first recorded and then posted for the membership.

Discussions are continuing with the administration concerning activities that the Emeriti Association might undertake with regard to undergraduate students along the lines of the Berkeley Emeriti Academy.

Planning is also underway for the annual Sylvia Winstein Emeriti Arts and Crafts Exhibit.

Finally, there was a drop in our membership at the time of the pandemic, in part because only email solicitations of membership renewals were made. We have returned to a combination of email and postal solicitations and membership has returned to pre-pandemic levels.

Beyond activities of the UCLA Emeriti Association, the UCLA Academic Senate in the past had a separate Emeriti Committee (the name varied over time). For reasons of economy, that committee was folded into the UCLA Faculty Welfare Committee. However, it remains unclear how certain functions of the old committee - particularly conferrals of emeriti status to those without ladder appointments and obituary statements - will be handled. We would be curious to know if other campuses have had relevant experiences. Are there separate emeriti senate committees in operation? Who handles conferrals and preparation and approval of obituary statements?
